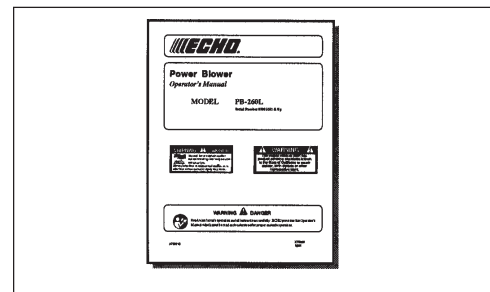

Wear sturdy work shoes with nonskid soles:

Keep long hair away from engine and blower intake. Retain hair with cap or net.

Hot Humid Weather

Heavy protective clothing can increase operator fatigue, which may lead to heat stroke. Schedule heavy work for early morning or late afternoon hours when temperatures are cooler.

Vibration and Cold

It is believed that a condition called Raynaud's Phenomenon, which affects the fingers of certain individuals, may be brought about by exposure to vibration and cold. Exposure to vibration and cold may cause tingling and burning sensations, followed by loss of color and numbness in the fingers. The following precautions are strongly recommended, because the minimum exposure, which might trigger the ailment, is unknown.

- Keep your body warm, especially the head, neck, feet, ankles, hands, and wrists.
- Maintain good blood circulation by performing vigorous arm exercises during frequent work breaks, and also by not smoking.
- Limit the hours of operation. Try to fill each day with jobs where operating the unit or other hand-held power equipment is not required.
- If you experience discomfort, redness, and swelling of the fingers followed by whitening and loss of feeling, consult your physician before further exposing yourself to cold and vibration.



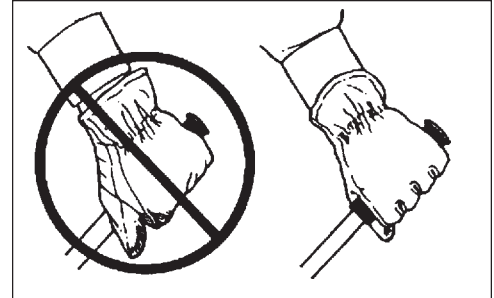
Repetitive Stress Injuries

It is believed that overusing the muscles and tendons of the fingers, hands, arms, and shoulders may cause soreness, swelling, numbness, weakness, and extreme pain in those areas. Certain repetitive hand activities may put you at a high risk for developing a Repetitive Stress Injury (RSI). An extreme RSI condition is Carpal Tunnel Syndrome (CTS), which could occur when your wrist swells and squeezes a vital nerve that runs through the area.

Some believe that prolonged exposure to vibration may contribute to CTS. CTS can cause severe pain for months or even years.

To reduce the risk of RSI/CTS, do the following:

- Avoid using your wrist in a bent, extended, or twisted position. Instead try to maintain a straight wrist position. Also, when grasping, use your whole hand, not just the thumb and index finger.
- Take periodic breaks to minimize repetition and rest your hands.
- Reduce the speed and force with which you do the repetitive movement.
- Do exercises to strengthen the hand and arm muscles.
- Immediately stop using all power equipment and consult a doctor if you feel tingling, numbness, or pain in the fingers, hands, wrists, or arms. The sooner RSI/CTS is diagnosed, the more likely permanent nerve and muscle damage can be prevented.

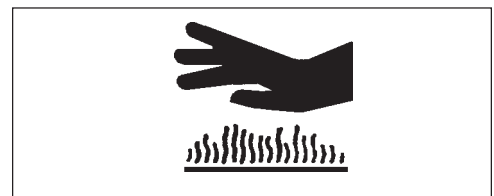
- Hold the front and rear handles with both hands, with thumbs and fingers encircling the handles.

1. **SAFETY DECAL** - Lists important safety precautions.
2. **SPARK PLUG** - Provides spark to ignite fuel mixture.
3. **SPARK ARRESTOR - CATALYTIC MUFFLER/MUFFLER** - The muffler or catalytic muffler controls exhaust noise and emission. The spark arrestor screen prevents hot, glowing particles of carbon from leaving the muffler. Keep exhaust area clear of flammable debris.
4. **FUEL TANK** - Contains fuel and fuel filter.
5. **FUEL TANK CAP** - Covers and seals fuel tank.
6. **PRIMER BULB** - Pumping primer bulb before starting engine draws fresh fuel from the fuel tank priming the carburetor for starting. Pump primer bulb until fuel is visible and flows freely in the clear fuel tank return line. Pump bulb an additional 4 or 5 times.
7. **AIR CLEANER** - Contains replaceable air filter element.
8. **CHOKE** - Move lever to "Cold Start" position for starting and emergency stopping. Move lever to "Run" position to run engine.
9. **HANDLE** - Rotates downward for throttle control access. Spring loaded for flexible operation.
10. **THROTTLE POSITION LEVER/STOP SWITCH** - Combination stop switch and variable speed throttle lever. When the lever is moved all the way forward the blower is at Wide Open Throttle (W.O.T.). When the lever is moved rearward to detent, the blower is at idle. When the lever is moved rearward past the idle detent the blower will stop.
11. **SHOULDER HARNESS** - Used to support unit on operator's back. The straps are adjustable.
12. **STICK HANDLE** - Provides comfortable grip for directing air flow.
13. **BLOWER PIPES** - Twist lock design.
14. **FLEXIBLE PIPE** - Allows for full range of movement.
15. **RECOIL STARTER HANDLE - RECOIL STARTER HANDLE/ROPE** - Pull recoil starter handle/rope using light pulling force, approximately 2/3 (2 ft.) of rope length. Two (2) to Six (6) pulls are required to properly tension starter spring prior to automatic engine engagement. **DO NOT** let handle snap back or damage to unit will occur.

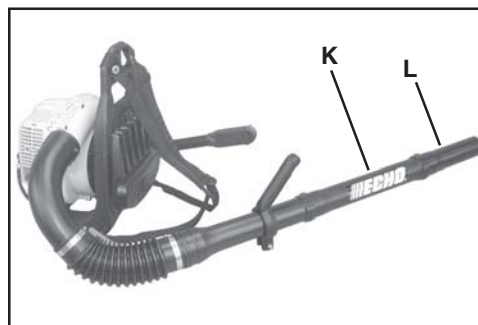
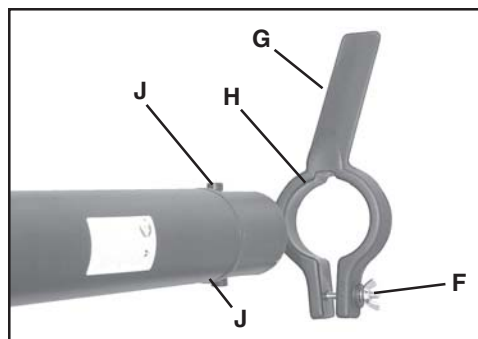
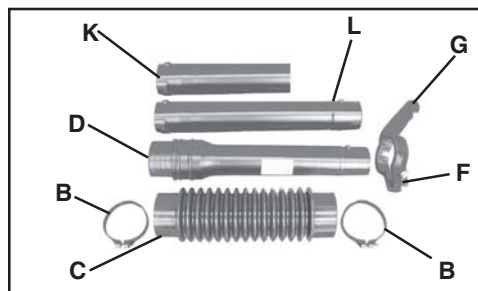
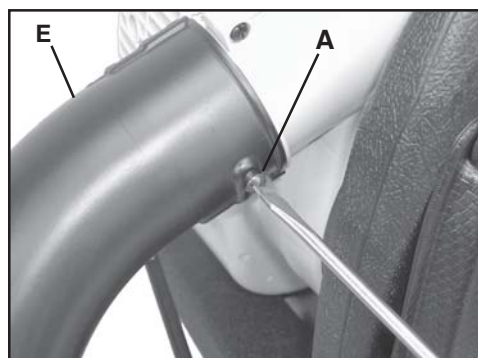
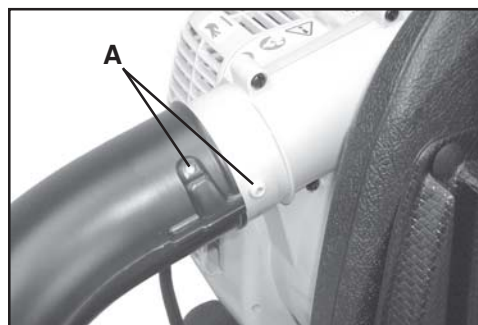
INSTALL BLOWER PIPES

1. Remove elbow retaining screw from blower housing.
2. Align grooves in elbow with pegs on blower housing and slide elbow onto housing.
3. Turn elbow clockwise to lock into place and align location holes (A) in elbow and blower housing.
4. Insert elbow retaining screw through holes (A) and tighten.
5. Assemble clamps (B) onto both ends of flexible pipe (C).
6. Assemble straight pipe with swivel (D) into flexible pipe (C) and tighten clamp (B).
7. Assemble flexible pipe (C) to elbow (E) on blower and tighten clamp (B).

NOTE

A light lubricant may be used to ease assembly of flexible pipe to blower elbow.

8. Loosen wing nut (F) completely and expand stick handle (G).
9. Align notch (H) in handle clamp with pipe pegs (J). Handle should be angled away from operator.
10. Slide handle onto swivel pipe.
11. Position handle for comfortable operation and tighten wing nut.
12. Assemble straight pipes (K and L) to swivel pipe, turning straight pipe clockwise to lock in place.



OPERATION

FUEL

Fuel Requirements

Gasoline - Use 89 Octane [R+M/2] (mid grade or higher) gasoline known to be good quality. Gasoline may contain up to 15% MTBE (methyl tertiary-butyl ether). Gasohol containing methyl (wood) alcohol is **NOT** approved.

Two Stroke Oil - A two-stroke engine oil meeting ISO-L-EGD (ISO/CD 13738) and J.A.S.O. FC Standards must be used. Echo brand premium Power Blend™ Universal 2-Stroke Oil meets these standards. Engine problems due to inadequate lubrication caused by failure to use an ISO-L-EGD and J.A.S.O. FC certified oil, such as Echo premium Power Blend™, will void the two-stroke engine warranty. (Emission related parts only are covered for two years, regardless of two-stroke oil used, per the statement listed in the Emission Defect Warranty Explanation.)

IMPORTANT

Echo premium Power Blend™ Universal 2-Stroke Oil may be mixed at 50:1 ratio for application in all Echo engines sold in the past regardless of ratio specified in those manuals.

Handling Fuel

WARNING DANGER

Fuel is VERY flammable. Use extreme care when mixing, storing or handling or serious personal injury may result.

- Use an approved fuel container.
- DO NOT smoke near fuel.
- DO NOT allow flames or sparks near fuel.
- Fuel tanks/cans may be under pressure. Always loosen fuel caps slowly allowing pressure to equalize.
- NEVER refuel a unit when the engine is HOT or RUNNING!
- DO NOT fill fuel tanks indoors. ALWAYS fill fuel tanks outdoors over bare ground.
- DO NOT overfill fuel tank. Wipe up spills immediately.
- Securely tighten fuel tank cap and close fuel container after refueling.
- Inspect for fuel leakage. If fuel leakage is found, do not start or operate unit until leakage is repaired.
- Move at least 3m (10 ft.) from refueling location before starting the engine.

Mixing Instructions

1. Fill an approved fuel container with half of the required amount of gasoline.
2. Add the proper amount of 2-stroke oil to gasoline.
3. Close container and shake to mix oil with gasoline.
4. Add remaining gasoline, close fuel container, and remix.

IMPORTANT

Spilled fuel is a leading cause of hydrocarbon emissions. Some states may require the use of automatic fuel shut-off containers to reduce fuel spillage.

After use

- DO NOT store a unit with fuel in its tank. Leaks can occur. Return unused fuel to an approved fuel storage container.

Storage - Fuel storage laws vary by locality. Contact your local government for the laws affecting your area. As a precaution, store fuel in an approved, airtight container. Store in a well-ventilated, unoccupied building, away from sparks and flames.

IMPORTANT

Stored fuel ages. Do not mix more fuel than you expect to use in thirty (30) days, ninety (90) days when a fuel stabilizer is added.

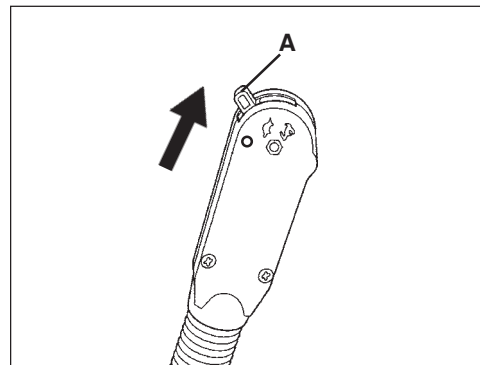
Stored two-stroke fuel may separate. ALWAYS shake fuel container thoroughly before each use.

STARTING COLD ENGINE

- Recoil starter: Use short pulls - only 1/2-2/3 of rope length for starting. Do not allow the rope to snap back in. Always hold the unit firmly.
- Rotate throttle handle downward to a comfortable operating position.

1. Throttle Lever

Move throttle lever (A) to IDLE DETENT position.

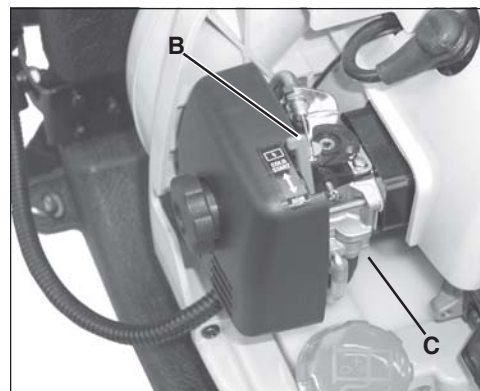


2. Choke

Move choke (B) to "Cold Start" Position (| |).

3. Primer

Pump primer bulb (C) until fuel is visible and flows freely in the clear fuel tank return line. Pump bulb an additional 4 or 5 times.



NOTE

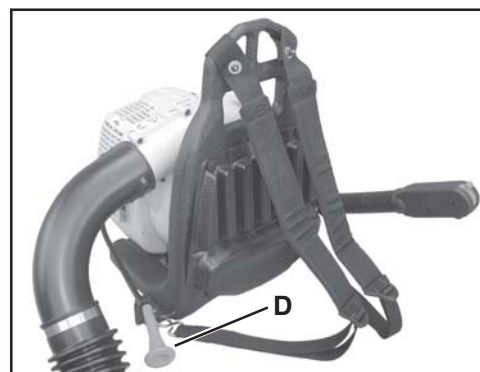
Energy is stored in the starter spring each time the handle/rope is pulled. Generally two to six pulls, using light pulling forces, will store enough energy to engage the starter and spin the engine. Do not pull the rope out to end stop.

4. Recoil Starter

Gently pull recoil starter handle/rope (D) until engine fires or 2 to 3 engine engagements.

5. Choke

Move choke (B) to "Run" position (| |) and if necessary, restart engine.



NOTE

Allow engine to warm up before use.

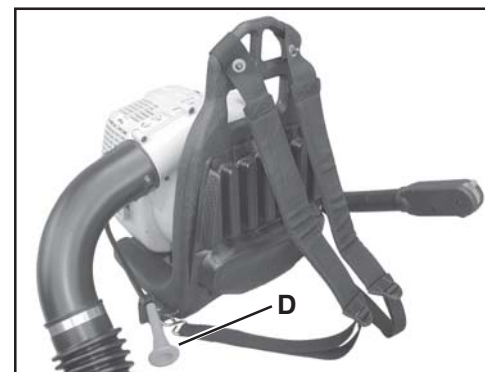
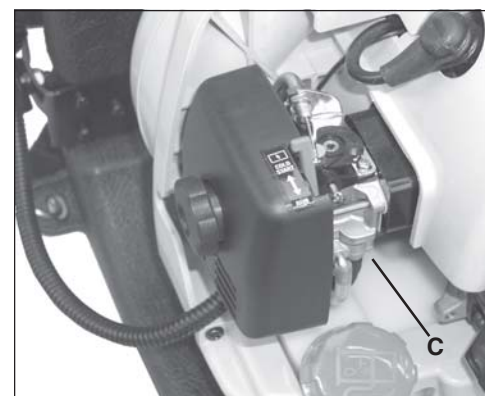
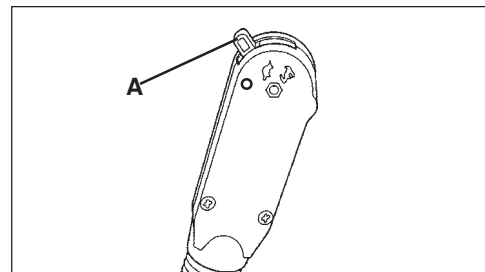
STARTING WARM ENGINE

The starting procedure is the same as Cold Start except DO NOT close the choke.

1. *Throttle Lever*
Move throttle lever (A) to idle detent position.
2. *Primer*
Pump primer bulb (C) until fuel is visible and flows freely in the clear fuel tank return line. Pump bulb an additional 4 or 5 times.
3. *Recoil Starter*
Gently pull recoil starter handle/rope (D) until engine fires.

NOTE

If engine does not start after 5 engine engagements, use cold start procedures.

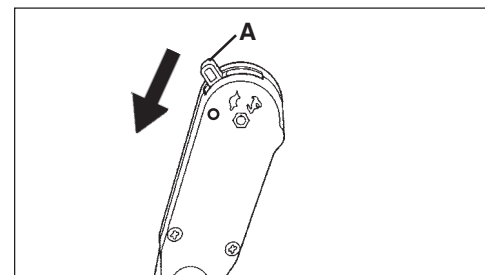


STOPPING ENGINE

1. *Throttle Lever*
Move throttle lever (A) to idle detent position and allow engine to return to idle before shutting off engine.
2. *Throttle Lever*
Move throttle lever (A) to "O" STOP position.

WARNING DANGER

If engine does not stop when stop switch is moved to STOP position, close choke - COLD START position - to stall engine. Have your ECHO dealer repair stop switch before using blower again.



OPERATING BLOWER

WARNING **DANGER**

Always wear safety glasses, hearing protection, face filter mask and take all safety precautions or serious personal injury may result.

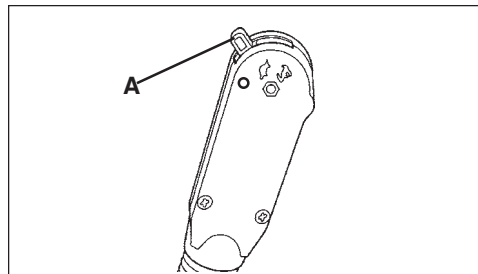
Do not point the blower pipe in the direction of people or pets.

Read the Safety Section carefully.

IMPORTANT

To avoid engine damage due to over-revving, do not block blower pipe opening.

1. Use only during appropriate hours.
2. Allow the engine to warm up at a fast idle for a few minutes.
3. Set engine speed with throttle lever (A).
4. Use lower speed to blow dry grass and leaves from walks, patios and drives.
5. Additional speed may be necessary to clean leaves from a lawn or flowerbed.
6. Higher speed may be necessary to move gravel, dirt, snow, bottles or cans from a driveway, street, parking lot or stadium.



NOTE

Never use a higher speed setting than necessary to perform a task. Remember, the higher the engine speed, the louder the blower noise. Minimize dust by using blower at lower speeds and by dampening material with water/mist when necessary. Keep debris on your property.
Be Smart - be a good neighbor.

MAINTENANCE

Your ECHO blower is designed to provide many hours of trouble free service. Regular scheduled maintenance will help your blower achieve that goal. If you are unsure or are not equipped with the necessary tools, you may want to take your unit to an ECHO Service Dealer for maintenance. To help you decide whether you want to DO-IT-YOURSELF or have the ECHO Dealer do it, each maintenance task has been graded. If task is not listed, see your ECHO Dealer for repairs.

ECHO offers **REPOWER™** Maintenance Kits and Parts to make your maintenance job easier. Just below each task heading are listed the various part numbers required for that task. See your ECHO dealer for these parts.

SKILL LEVELS

- Level 1** = Easy to do. Most required tools come with unit.
- Level 2** = Moderate difficulty. Some specialized tools may be required.
- Level 3** = Experience required. Specialized tools are required. Echo recommends that the unit be returned to your ECHO dealer for service.

AIR FILTER


Level 1.

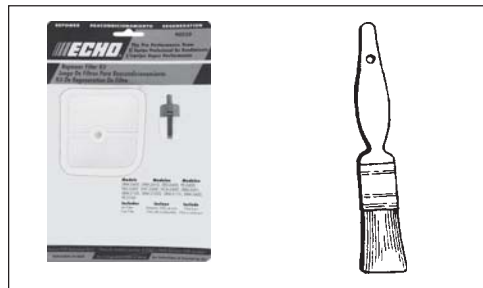
Tools required: 25-50 mm (1-2 in.) cleaning brush.

Parts required: 90030 REPOWER™ Air and Filter Kit

NOTE

Clean daily.

1. Close choke (Cold Start Position []). This prevents dirt from entering the carburetor throat when the air filter is removed. Brush accumulated dirt from the air cleaner area.
2. Remove the air cleaner cover. Clean and inspect the element for damage. If element is fuel soaked and very dirty, replace.
3. If element can be cleaned and reused, be certain it:
 - still fits the cavity in the air cleaner cover.
 - is installed with the original side out.



FUEL FILTER

Level 1.

Tools required: 200-250 mm (8-10 in.) length of wire with one end bent into a hook. Clean rag, funnel, and an approved fuel container.

Parts required: 90030 REPOWER™ Air and Filter Kit

WARNING DANGER

Fuel is **VERY** flammable. Use extreme care when mixing, storing or handling.

1. Use a clean rag to remove loose dirt from around fuel cap and empty fuel tank.
2. Use the “fuel line hook” to pull the fuel line and filter from the tank.
3. Remove the filter from the line and install the new filter.



SPARK PLUG

Level 2.

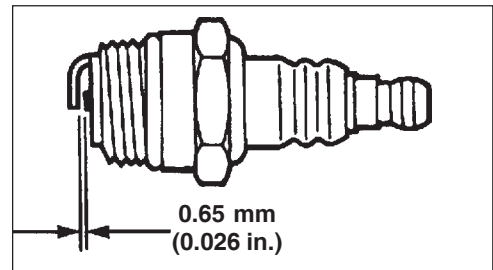
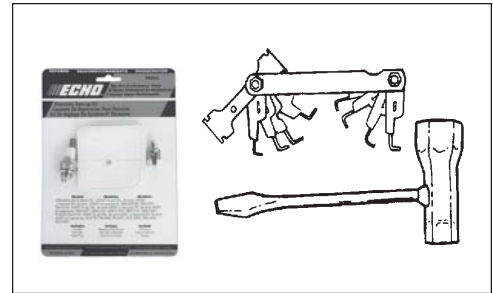
Tools required: 3/4 in. Spark Plug deep socket, Feeler gauge

Parts Required: REPOWER™ Tune-Up Kit P/N 90075

IMPORTANT

Use only NGK BPM-8Y spark plug (BPMR-8Y in Canada) otherwise severe engine damage may occur.

1. Remove spark plug and check for fouling, worn and rounded center electrode.
2. Clean the plug or replace with a new one. DO NOT sand blast to clean. Remaining sand will damage engine.
3. Adjust spark plug gap by bending outer electrode.
4. Tighten spark plug to 150-170 kg/cm (130-150 in. lb.).



COOLING SYSTEM

Level 2.

Tools required: 25-50 mm (1-2 in.) cleaning brush, 3 mm Hex Wrench, Cross Head Screwdriver

Parts Required: None, if you are careful.

IMPORTANT

To maintain proper engine operating temperatures, cooling air must pass freely through the cylinder fin area. This flow of air carries combustion heat away from the engine.

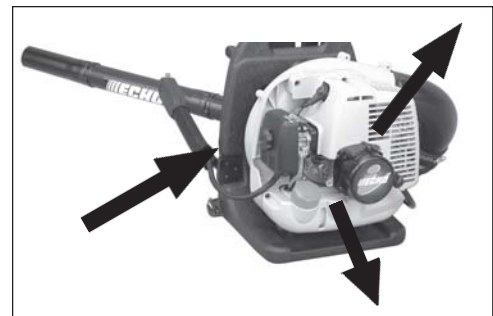
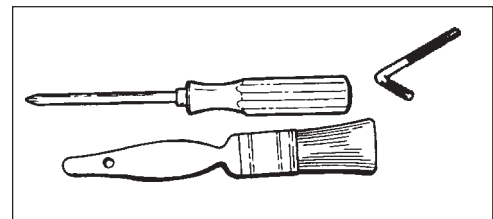
Overheating and engine seizure can occur when:

- Air intakes are blocked, preventing cooling air from reaching the cylinder.
- Dust and grass build up on the outside of the cylinder. This build up insulates the engine and prevents the heat from leaving.

Removal of cooling passage blockages or cleaning of cooling fins is considered "Normal Maintenance." Any failure attributed to lack of maintenance is not warranted.

Cleaning Grill

1. Remove accumulated debris from intake grill between backpack frame and blower housing.



Cleaning Cylinder Fins

1. Disconnect spark plug lead from spark plug and remove spark plug.
2. Remove 3 screws (A) from starter assembly and remove starter.

WARNING **DANGER**

The starter assembly contains a powerful spring that may have stored energy. DO NOT disassemble starter. Disassembly of starter may result in serious personal injury.

3. Remove (4) engine cover screws (B).
4. Remove (4) starter base screws (C).
5. Remove engine cover and starter base.

NOTE

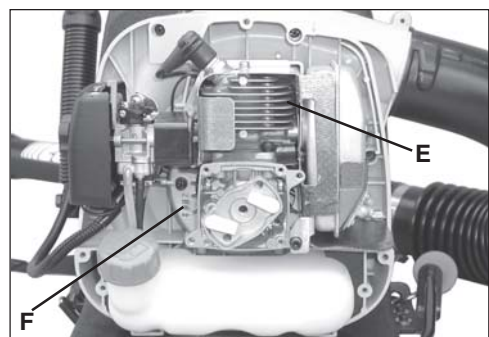
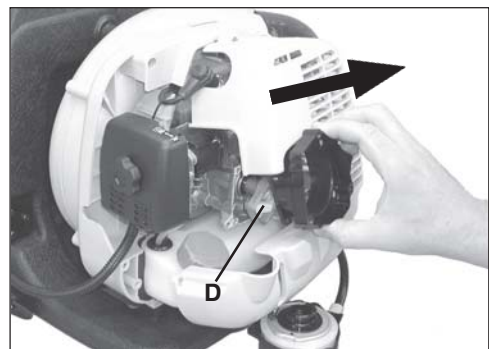
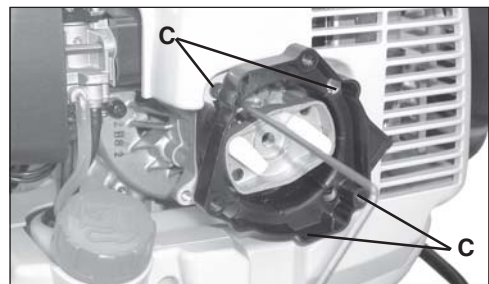
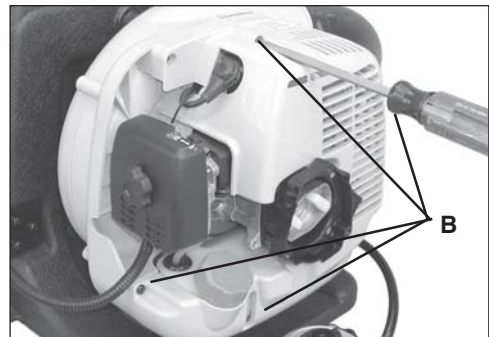
Upper lip of starter base fits behind engine cover screw holes. Guide starter base opening over starter pawl assembly (D), and remove base and cover together.

6. Install spark plug to prevent dirt and debris from entering engine.
7. Cover starter pawl assembly (D) and starter assembly with a clean rag to protect from dirt and debris during cleaning.
8. Clean cylinder fins (E) to allow cooling air to pass freely.

IMPORTANT

DO NOT use a metal scraper to remove dirt from the cylinder fins.

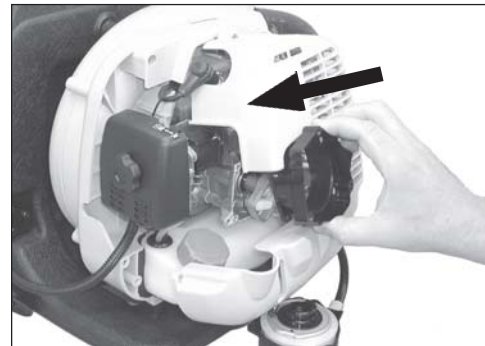
9. Clean air intake grid area (F).



10. Install engine cover with starter base. Make sure mounting holes are aligned.
11. Install (4) base screws. Do not tighten.
12. Install (4) engine cover screws. Do not tighten.
13. Tighten starter base screws and engine cover screws.
14. Install starter housing and secure with 3 screws.

NOTE

When installing starter housing to starter base be sure drive starter cam engages the starter pawls correctly.

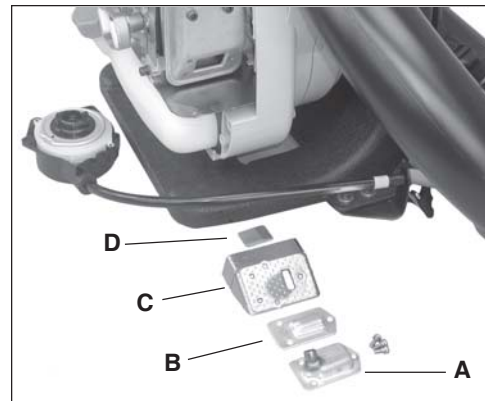
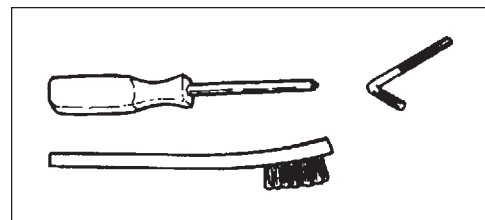

IMPORTANT

Carbon deposits in muffler will cause a drop in engine output and overheating. Spark arrestor screen must be checked periodically.

1. Remove starter assembly and engine cover as described in "Cleaning Cylinder Fins," pages 19 - 20.
2. Remove spark arrestor covers (A) and (B), gasket (C), and spark arrestor screen (D) from muffler. Replace screen if it has holes burned through, or is plugged with carbon deposits.
3. Install spark arrestor screen, gasket, and covers.
4. Install engine cover and starter assembly.



Cylinder Exhaust Port

Level 3.

IMPORTANT

The cylinder exhaust port must be inspected and cleaned of excess carbon every 3 months or 90 hours of operation in order to maintain this engine within the emissions durability period. ECHO strongly recommends that you return your unit to your ECHO dealer for this important maintenance service.

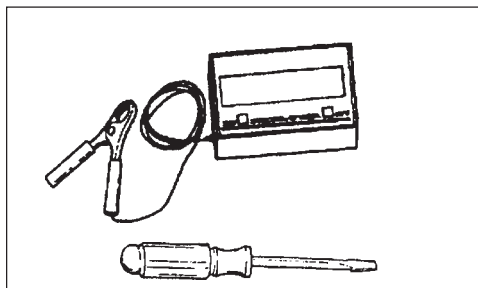

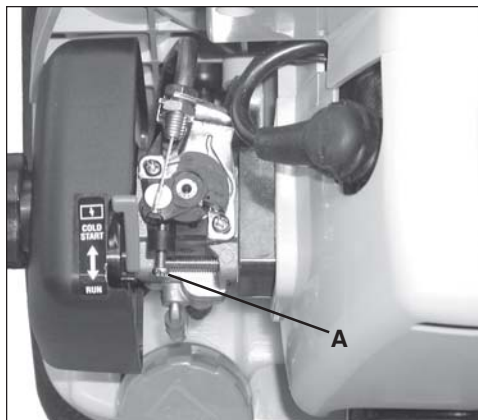
Every unit is run at the factory and the carburetor is set in compliance with emission regulations. Carburetor adjustments, other than idle speed, must be performed by an authorized ECHO dealer.



Before Adjustment

Check that:

- Air filter is clean and properly installed.
 - Spark arrestor screen is free of carbon.
 - Blower pipes are installed.
1. Start engine, run at idle for one minute.
 2. Complete warm up by running at full throttle for 5 minutes, operating choke twice to clear air from carburetor chambers.
 3. Check idle speed and reset if necessary. If a tachometer is available, idle speed screw (A) should be set to the specifications found on Page 10 "Specifications" of this manual. Turn idle screw (A) clockwise to increase idle speed; counter clockwise to decrease idle speed.

STORAGE

WARNING DANGER

During operation the muffler - catalytic muffler and surrounding cover become hot. Always keep exhaust area clear of flammable debris during transportation or when storing, otherwise serious property damage or personal injury may result.

Long Term Storage (Over 30 Days)

Do not store your unit for a prolonged period of time (30 days or longer) without performing protective storage maintenance which includes the following:

1. Store unit in a dry, dust free place, out of the reach of children.

WARNING DANGER

Do not store where fuel fumes may accumulate or reach an open flame or spark.

2. Place the stop switch in the "STOP" position.
3. Remove accumulation of grease, oil, dirt and debris from exterior of unit.
4. Perform all periodic lubrication and services that are required.
5. Tighten all screws and nuts.
6. **Drain** the fuel tank **completely** and pull the recoil starter handle several times to remove fuel from the carburetor.
7. Remove the spark plug and pour 7cc (1/4 oz.) of fresh, clean ECHO 2-stroke engine oil into the cylinder through the spark plug hole.
 - A. Place a clean cloth over the spark plug hole.
 - B. Pull the recoil starter handle 2-3 times to distribute the oil inside the engine.
 - C. Observe the piston location through the spark plug hole. Pull the recoil handle slowly until the piston reaches the top of its travel and leave it there.
8. Install the spark plug (do not connect ignition cable).
9. Remove blower pipe assembly from unit.

IMPORTANT

Do not store the unit with tension remaining on the starter spring.
